### **The Good News**

I was waiting at the bus stop with one of my kids one morning when I saw a child from the neighborhood get tripped up on her feet and fall down on the sidewalk. Her palm looked a little scraped up, but before any adult could even check on her, her friend who had been playing with her bent over and helped her stand up. She then gave her a hug, and they went right back to chasing each other around on the sidewalk. The game continued, the bus came, school happened, and all was well.

The simple kindness of children, like these two, can teach us so much these days. When the first child fell, the other child didn't ask her what she did wrong to cause the fall. She didn't berate her or make fun of her. She didn't lecture her on how not to fall again, or compound the scraped hand with bruising words. She just helped her, hugged her, and they played on. The girl who fell was soon resiliently running around again, squealing and laughing, and when the bus came they both groaned because they were having so much fun.

It's possible for all of us to be this way with neighbor and stranger all the time. We can build each other up and help each other when we fall. We can embrace instead of judge and support instead of berate. We can know that just as others fall, we fall too, and that when that happens a kind word and gentle presence can bring us back to joy and play. An ethic of care can guide us, and when we live that ethic, we become friendlier, more neighborly, and more civil. We create the world that we want our children to grow into.

Unitarian Universalism is about building lives where we lift each other up and help each other along. We do so in an embracing and open-minded way that appreciates diversity and affirms pluralism. We believe that to serve one another and the world is to serve the Holy, and that this call to serve sounds differently in various times, places, and traditions. We learn from these different soundings, all the while listening for the guidance and demands of Love, which we believe to be at the center of a holy and human life.

Love, in the form of care, caused the one child to help the other. And we adults who were watching saw the result: the return of joy, the building of resiliency, and the deepening of friendship. Before they even got to school, those girls had taught us something important about caring for one another that morning. It's now up to us to practice what they taught until it becomes as natural to us as it was to them.

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#### UU HISTORY- The Great OVER - Ground Esacpe of Slaves - by Carl H. Haag

This background may help you understand the story that follows. Just outside the gold-domed State House in Boston stands the statue of Horace Mann. Mann, a Unitarian, helped found the first public school in America, was the first secretary of the Massachusetts Board of Education, served as a member of Congress, and at age 56, in 1852, became the first president of Antioch College in Ohio. A few years later, after establishing this co-educational college that was open to Negroes, he concluded his commencement day address with this powerful statement, "I beseech you to treasure up in your hearts these my parting words: Be ashamed to die until you have won some victory for humanity." Mann died a few days later. These words were both an inspiration and a burden for Antioch graduates. Carl Haag, Class of 1952

The Conway family of Falmoth, Virginia, were prosperous and well-connected Methodists. Walter Conway was a businessman and a county judge. His wife, Margaret, was a homeopathic physician and a direct descendent of a Declaration of Independence signer. Although Margaret was [quietly] opposed to slavery, the family owned 50-60 slaves.

The Conways had several children and one of their sons, Moncure, was born in 1832 and grew up around slaves. As a young man, he attended college in Pennsylvania, earning his bachelor's degree at the age of 17, then went to Harvard Divinity School from which he graduated in 1854. His educational experiences, especially in Boston, and being a protege of Ralph Waldo Emerson, led Moncure to become a leading Southern abolitionist.

The Reverend Conway became minister of the Unitarian Church in Washington in 1854. He was dismissed after one year, perhaps because he said, "As long as there are slaves, we are all slaves." He decided to go west and became the minister of the Cincinnati Unitarian Church.

Occasionally the Conways would summer in Yellow Springs, Ohio where Moncure was drawn because of Horace Mann and the way that Mann's legacy of tolerance and progressivism influenced the town. In the summer of 1862 while staying in Yellow Springs, he received news from his mother. During the Civil War, his father and his brothers were away serving in the Confederate army. When the fighting came near his family home, 31 of the family slaves had left to try to reach freedom in Washington, DC. His mother was worried about their welfare, as they were on their own for the first time.

Conway immediately left for Washington on a train. When he arrived three days later, he found two of them, Dunmore and Eliza Gwinn, who had opened a candy shop and a laundry business in Georgetown. They had already saved \$60 in the short time after fleeing the plantation. Though they had not seen Conway for years, they respected and trusted him. When he proposed that they and the other Conway family slaves come with him to Yellow Springs, they agreed. Conway found the other slaves in what might be called "Divine Luck." On a hunch, he set out at night in a heavy thun-

derstorm to a section of Georgetown where a number of African American had cottages. The sound of people singing spirituals eventually led him to a cottage where the remaining slaves had gathered. They too were wet having just arrived from their 60-mile trek from Virginia.

Conway had good contacts in Washington and met with Treasury Secretary Chase who was a prominent abolitionist and was able to arrange meetings with President Lincoln. Lincoln warned Conway about the danger of going through Baltimore. [This was where Pinkerton had to secretly move Lincoln on his way to his inauguration because of the Baltimore plot to assassinate him.] Therefore, Lincoln arranged to have General Wadsworth make sure they got to Baltimore safely.

The entourage of Conway and the slaves arrived in Baltimore where they had to walk several miles to the next station. There, the sight of a white man leading 31 slaves attracted an angry crowd of local free blacks. The situation could have been dangerous for Conway, but the tension was diffused as the crowd learned of the escape plan from the slaves. The crowd then escorted them safely to the other train station. They faced an opposite problem there where a group of whites would not let them board the train. However, the train crew enabled them to board the train that would take them to Yellow Springs, Ohio.

Upon arriving in Yellow Springs, the group found shelter in Moses Grinnell's barn, and gradually set up homesteads in and around the Glen. With the Conway colony established, Yellow Springs became known as a welcoming community for freed slaves to live, which ultimately attracted multiple families beyond the initial group.

A dozen years after they rode the over-ground railroad to freedom, Conway visited the Gwinns. He found that "they had a good house, five well-kept acres, poultry and pigs, and that Dunmore's family were the coloured gentry of the region." Some of the former slaves moved elsewhere, including Washington, DC. but many remain in town to this day. Dunmore's sister, Julia, was among those who stayed and her great grandson, Jim McKee, served as chief of the Yellow Springs police from 1959 to 1993.

Note: Carol and I first heard this tale from Professor Scott Holland at the UU History and Heritage Society in Baltimore in October a few years ago. Then I found an article in a 2012-2013 issue of <u>In the Glen</u> that had additional details of how the slaves reached this large wilderness area adjacent to the Antioch Campus.
