### The Good News

#### The Good News, Rev. Bill Neely

I love those moments when one person is leaving somewhere just as I am walking in, or vice versa, and we both pause to hold open the door for each other. We each want the other to go first, each of us insisting, sometimes several times, on being neighborly to this other person whom we've never met and will likely never see again. "You go," Oh please, you go," "You first," back and forth once or twice or three times until inevitably we both go at the same time and have to back up a step. I love this awkward choreography of causal kindness. The stop/ start/stop of it until it all works out and we go on our separate ways, often smiling a little. I even like seeing this dance when others do it.

So much of life can be like that: considerate, polite, and silly. Though difficult to remember when the days are stressful and the times are divisive, an inner seed of kindness grows in everyone you meet. And we nourish those seeds within each other every time we offer simple pleasantries to unknown neighbors and passing strangers. The lights of others grow those holy, human seeds within us, and we grow them in the people we encounter, even when the meetings are so brief. Even then, we create a moment of beauty and kindness where one did not previously exist. We make those moments happen and then walk away, smiling and more practiced to co-create the world in the same way, anew and again.



#### January 2025: Children and Youth Ministry

As we transition into the New Year, we share with you some of the activities our children, middle school youth and adult guides have experienced together thus far this congregational year. We've been making new friends, learning about our shared UU values, reflecting on our own identity and lenses on the world, and engaging play as a spiritual practice. Since August we have welcomed nine new families and eleven children & youth to our program. It has been a great pleasure to extend both a welcome back to so many and a welcome to UU Princeton to new friends. The energy on Sunday mornings is palpable. What a joy it is to be together!

As our program continues to grow, we will look to you - our adult congregation - to support us as class leaders and guides. With the number of children & youth now involved, we anticipate that the program will require at least 6 more volunteers by September. What an exciting prospect!

Age Group: Pre-K/Kindergarten, Program: <u>Chalice Children</u> supplemented by lessons/activities curated by our leaders. Adult Guides: Kari Dalane, Jon Krejci, Betsy Marshall, Lydia Rieck - with support from Molly Sharlach. Assistants: Cathy Bauer-Koggan, Florin Daly & Clem Zimmer. Thirteen Children are registered in this age group, with 6-9 attending each Sunday.

From Molly: In one lesson this fall, "we read the book *A Sick Day for Amos McGee*, about a man who works at a zoo and gets a visit from his animal friends to cheer him up when he's sick. We asked the kids to make cards for people in our congregation who might be sick or lonely, but they all wanted to make cards for their parents, which was also sweet.

From Lydia: In one of our last gatherings, "We talked about the Solstice and read a kids' solstice book. We pretended to be planets circling around the sun. We talked about how many people celebrate with light or fire, because the sun's light will come back and the days will get longer. The kids made some (really delightful!) candle holders with sculpy, greens, and sparkly stuff.

Age Group: 1st-4th Grades, Program: <u>Lego ValUUes</u>, Adult Guides: Jo Ellen Burton, Alice Deanin, John Stash & Chris Sturm. Assistants: Nicole Campbell, Rachel Neely, Cheryl Stash, Farooq Zama. Eighteen Children are registered in this age group, with 8-12 attending each Sunday.

From Chris: in our lesson focused on the UU value of Justice, "the kids loved the book we read, *All the Way to the Top*, by Annette Bay Pimental, which is based on the true-life story of Jennifer Keelan-Chaffins. Jennifer was handicapped by cerebral palsy and played a key role as a child advocate to help win passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act. The kids were fascinated to learn at the end that she was not a fictional character. Then we split into two groups to walk around the building and look for things that are impediments to folks with handicaps, and things that help them. Some of the kids like to be silly, which can be contagious, but we have many wonderful learning moments and it's fun to watch them get to know each other better."

Age Group: 5th-8th Grades, Program: <u>*Windows & Mirrors*</u>, Adult Guides: Beth Behrend, Binnie Thom & Michael Weeks. Assistants: Dave Avasthi, Regine Clement, Sofia Strauss. Eight Youth are registered in this age group, with 3-5 attending each Sunday.

Our lessons focus on how UUs value multiple perspectives as contributing to our collective pursuit of truth, fairness, justice and love — and work on better understanding ourselves in relationship to others. Each youth has been crafting their own "window/mirror" that reflects their own identity and lenses on the world, adding elements as the year progresses. The hope is to offer them opportunities to help with various congregation events throughout the year. Thus far, they made table decorations for our Sunday service in which we take a collection for Arm in Arm.

In one of our Sunday lessons, we affirmed the relevance and meaning of church attendance for individuals and asked the children to consider these for themselves. The Sunday following, the youth interviewed 4 adult congregants, asking these questions: *Why do you come to church? What one word best describes your congregational attachment? Is there a location in the church that is particularly meaningful to you? Why is the presence of children at church important to you personally?* 

#### Age Group: 7th-9th Grades, Program: Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education

In collaboration with the Unitarian Universalist Church at Washington Crossing and including youth from the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Somerset Hills as well. UU Princeton Facilitators: Lauren Foss and Rebecca Thompson (there are also 2 facilitators from UUCWC). Sixteen Youth are registered for OWL, including four youth from UU Princeton.

This year our 7th-9th grade OWL participants (and facilitators) are using the newly revised (and long awaited) 2nd edi-

tion of the curriculum. The 2nd edition is more relevant to and inclusive of queer youth, specifically, and participants of all gender identities and sexual orientations more generally. Over the year they will reflect together on puberty changes, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, healthy relationships, responsible sexual behavior, and communicating about sexuality, among other topics. In January the youth will welcome a LGBTQ+ panel in which they may learn the stories and perspectives from panel members and ask questions. Youth from three different UU congregations are getting to know one another and build friendships while having these important and brave conversations. We are grateful to our partners at UUCWC and a collaboration that allows a diverse set of youth to have this experience - from 3 congregations.

**9th-12th Grade YoUUth Group:** In collaboration with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Somerset Hills. UU Princeton Advisor: Deana Graffeo Weeks. (and we'd love another to join her). Eight Youth are registered in this age group, including seven youth from UU Princeton. UUCSH have two advisors who support our shared YoUUth Group programming. The group meets for social events, community service and spiritual growth with a model in which youth are empowered to design their "curriculum" with mentorship from their advisors.

#### <u>UU HISTORY- CLARA BARTON - Part Two, Life in DC and the Civil War</u> By Carl H.Haag

Clara Barton was 33 when she went to Washington, DC to visit her sister, Sally. She had always lived in small towns and found the city of forty thousand to be exciting. She toured the city, sat in the galleries of the Senate, and was at the inauguration of President Lincoln.

She got a job copying letters in the government Patent Office and was not paid as much as the men there. That did not sit well with them, and they made life miserable for her. Their anger increased when she was promoted to the position of Confidential Secretary and was assigned to find out who was leaking secret documents from the Patent Office. She found the men who were guilty of the crime — the same ones who had tried to get rid of her.

The Civil War started. The first troops to reach Washington were from her area of Massachusetts, including some of her former students. They had been attacked in Baltimore by Southern sympathizers and arrived in Washington bruised, hungry, and without luggage. They were quartered in the Senate Chambers, sleeping on the floor. Clara went to them there and asked what they needed and pledged to return the next day.

On Sunday morning a procession of five strapping Black men, staggering under five huge baskets, being led by a prim little woman were seen by churchgoers. Using her own savings, Clara had bought food, clothing, blankets for them. She had been up all night tearing up sheets and petticoats to make handkerchiefs and bandages for the troops.

Barton soon knew that the wounded and sick soldiers were not being taken care of and many were dying, even from the lack of food and water. She bombarded the War Department, senators, and others for permission to go to the battlefield to supply the men with medical and other supplies. The War Department stated they did not need her help and that women were not permitted on the battlefields.

Two years passed before the Surgeon General finally gave her a pass to go and take others with her to the battle areas. Transportation for her supplies and workers to unload supplies would be provided. Clara conferred with medical and army officers, the newly formed Sanitary Commission, whose president was the Unitarian Rev. Dr. Henry W. Bellows, which was investigating conditions on the battlefield, and Dorothea Dix [a Unitarian], the Superintendent of Army Nurses, so Barton could find out what was needed.

She did, and in 1863 organized a wagon train to take medical supplies to the front near Harpers Ferry. The eight drovers were a rough lot, who had been at some horrible battles, and swore they would never go back. Here they were heading back under the command of a woman. They stopped early but Clara told them it would be in their interests to drive on until nightfall. After they stopped and set up camp, Clara invited them to join her for a hot meal from her supplies, there was a cloth on the ground, and Clara went around pouring hot coffee for them.

Later, as Clara sat by the fire, the men emerged from the darkness, and the spokesman said, "We've been mean and contrary to you all day. You've treated us like gentlemen and you made us the best meal we have had in two years. It makes us ashamed and we ask your forgiveness. We shan't trouble you no more." The next morning the men made breakfast for Clara.

We will read the book independently and meet for discussion and questions after the service on Jan. 19, led by Audrey Pico and Elissa Hoeger.
